FROM THE PULPIT

WHAT TO DO ABOUT THE DARKNESS THAT SURROUNDS US... AND THAT WHICH IS WITHIN US **Rabbi Daniel Isaak**

"The pupils and disciples of a Hasidic rabbi approached their spiritual leader with a complaint about the prevalence of evil in the world. Intent upon driving out the forces of darkness they requested the rabbi to counsel them. The rabbi suggested that they take brooms and attempt to sweep the darkness from the cellar. The bewildered disciples applied themselves to sweeping out the darkness, but to no avail. The rabbi then advised his followers to take sticks and to beat vigorously at the darkness to drive out the evil. When this likewise failed, he counseled them to go down again to the cellar and to protest against the darkness and to shout imprecations to drive out the evil. When this, too, failed, he said, 'My children, let each of you meet the challenge of darkness by lighting a candle.' The disciples descended to the cellar and kindled their lights. They looked, and behold! The darkness had been driven out."



WANDERING IN THE WOODS: A PORTLANDER'S SEARCH FOR JEWISH IDENTITY



Neveh Shalom congregant Ken Klein has been making the Neveh news more and more recently. A writer and videographer, Ken has been integral to projects at Neveh Shalom, including a hysterical Mad Men sketch written and produced for the Martinis and Mitzvot auction, and an upbeat yet touching video for our High School/Tichon graduation class.

When not producing Neveh videos or shooting local events and bar and bat mitzvahs, Klein has been working on a documentary: "Wandering in the Woods: A Portlander's Search for Jewish Identity". A self-admitted "lapsed Jew", Klein's search was sparked by his son coming home from school one day with questions about his own Jewish status. Camera in hand, Klein interviewed Rabbi after Rabbi asking them all one specific question: "Is my son a Jew?". As it turns out, answers ran the gamut, provoked some serious soul searching and provided the impetus with talk with others - artists, writers, parents and students - about their own relationships to Jewish Identity.

FROM THE PULPIT (CONTINUED)

The months of July and August correspond this year almost precisely to the Hebrew months of Av and Elul. Following the nadir of the 9th of Av we begin a seven week ascent to Rosh Hashanah. Concomitant to that spiritual climb the entire month of Elul is devoted to getting ourselves prepared for the soul searching in which we engage during those Ten Days of Repentance that conclude with Yom Kippur. We too are duty bound to complain about the evil we see in the world: hunger and poverty, war and terrorism, crime and unequal opportunity. We also recognize evil in our own community: breakdown of the family as well as disrespectful speech between groups and intolerance for views that disagree with our own. But the most difficult darkness to recognize are the evils bound up in each of our own souls: arrogance and a lack of humility, that we are too quick to anger and too slow to appreciate and acknowledge the efforts of loved ones on our behalf, that we are too self-righteous about our own actions and too unwilling to forgive the slights of others.

Let us devote this time of the year to introspection so that we can come to the reflective prayers of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur having done the necessary homework incumbent upon each and every one of us. As the rabbi taught his Hasidic disciples, sweeping, beating and shouting however much we try will never get us closer to our goal. It is the difficult work of lighting candles that will cause light to shine in dark places, making us better people and the world a better place in which to live.

We are the largest Jewish congregation in a city which has developed a reputation as an attractive work destination. We have a beautifully renovated facility filled with a diverse membership. We have a stellar education department. We have varied and exciting programming. As such, your Board believes we owe a responsibility to our Kehilah to at least entertain and invite applications from the many talented Rabbis in the Conservative movement who may be interested in the position of senior Rabbi.

We will begin preparing for the process of searching for Rabbi Isaak's replacement after this year's High Holidays, with the active search beginning next summer, in 2014. The participation of the entire Kehilah will be essential in our consideration of Rabbi Greenstein, as well as the other candidates.

Separate from the clergy search process, we will begin our formal evaluation process, which this year includes Rabbi Greenstein, along with Cantor Bletstein and our Executive Director, Fred Rothstein. As part of our formal review process, within the next few months, you will be asked to complete an evaluation on each. Please take the time to give your most meaningful insights.

Of the three evaluations, Rabbi Greenstein's is a contract renewal review. We expect that his evaluation will result in the board being authorized to renew Rabbi Greenstein's engagement as associate Rabbi. Beyond that, we will keep the Kehilla informed on the search process and provide meaningful opportunities to evaluate candidates for the position. Ultimately, as our By-laws direct: "The senior Rabbi...shall be chosen by the members of the Congregation at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation or at a special meeting called for that purpose." Our board encourages everyone to take part in this very important decision.

As we celebrate Rabbi Stampfer's 60th year and Rabbi Isaak's 20th year with Neveh Shalom, we look forward to honoring our past, celebrating our present and envisioning our future. Our Kehilah will surely be experiencing an exciting period in our history. It will be my honor to serve as the board's president for the next year, before giving way to our president-elect, Rich Meyer.

There are many Jewish nature prayers, but just saying a prayer may not be enough. Let the words sink in, feel the holiness of the moment, and let go of details otherwise clouding your mind. With the right *kavvanah* (intention), prayer can be a portal to a deeper appreciation, respect, and even love for nature.

When seeing wonders of nature, lightening, shooting stars, deserts, high mountains, or a sunrise, we say "Baruch atah adonai eloheinu melech ha'olam, oh-seh ma'a-seih v'reisheet. Praised be You Adonai, our God, sovereign of the universe, source of creation." When seeing trees or creatures of striking beauty, "Baruch atah ..., sheh-kakhah lo b'olamo. Praised be You ..., who has such beauty in Your world."

On seeing the ocean, "Baruch atah ..., sheh-asah et-ha-yam ha-gadol or Praised be You ..., who made the great sea". When hearing thunder or seeing a storm, "Baruch atah ..., sheh-ko-cho u-g'vurato ma-lei olam" or Praised be You ..., whose power and might fill the whole world".

Neveh Shalom sponsors a college outreach program to help our young adults who are away at college or in the military to stay connected with Neveh Shalom and home. Parents come together over the academic year to send five packages around Jewish holidays and a birthday mailing.

This year we sent packages to 35 participants for Rosh Hashanah, Chanukah, Tu B'shvat, Purim, Lag B'Omer. We included school supplies, honey sticks, gelt, hamentaschen, gift cards, handmade greeting cards and stamps, munchies, and tchotchkes.

If you are a parent of a 17-22 year old, you will get an email soon asking you to sign your child(ren) up for the 2013-2014 academic year. Even if you don't have the address yet, sign up now, and update the address later. Although parents are asked to make a donation to help support the program, we are funded through parent and congregant donations, and we send packages to all young adults in college and the military whose parents sign them up.

5 QUESTIONS TO A BOARD MEMBER


