#### FROM THE PULPIT

# Purim Is Not Just "Fur Die Kinder" Any More

As children, we all have fond memories of dressing up for Purim. Our Esthers and Mordecais over the years have morphed into ninja turtles and super heroes. Our parents came, but the focus was almost exclusively on the children. We drowned out Haman's name with groggers and gorged on



Hamentashen. We sang ridiculous songs about foolish King Ahashuerus and our triumphant heroes who outwitted wicked Haman. Though in truth a terrifying and violent story, we softened Purim's message to more or less the old joke: "They tried to kill us, we won, let's eat!"

But Purim is much more than that. Anthropologists tell us that Purim falls into a genre of late-winter, pre-spring frivolous holidays which include modern day celebrations such as Mardi Gras, Carnival and St. Patrick's Day, among others. Each of these merrymaking occasions, though based on completely different origins, have many aspects in common such as dressing up in costumes and drinking alcohol. (Jews were permitted to drink on Purim, we are told, until they couldn't tell the difference between 'blessed be Mordecai' and 'cursed be Haman'!) Then some weeks later with the advent of spring each of these cultures would observe a major serious festival—for us, of course, that's Passover.

So then why have we so easily relegated silliness exclusively to the children? I don't see that happening to the other pre-spring holidays. Just as those occasions are intended for and engaged in by adults, so ought Purim to be. It's the Jewish opportunity to drop certain standards of propriety and let loose. It's our organized opening to use our imaginations to allow ourselves to be a bit outrageous and maybe not just a bit... Do things that do not fit our year-round public persona. Dress up. Create inventive noisemakers. If a bit of alcohol for those over 21 helps to lower our respectability and dignity, why not? If not on Purim, then when?

And as we shout and holler with catcalls and other bellows of approval and disapproval during the Megillah reading, we should remember that the message of Purim is not entirely frivolous. Jews in serious danger in various places and times looked to the story of Purim with hope. Could they be saved from the clutches of tyrants by an Esther or Mordecai in high places?

The Megillah gave Jews hope for the future. Though all too often they suffered, they

#### From the President

Do you identify yourself as a member of Neveh Shalom because you are Jewish or do you identify yourself as a member of Neveh Shalom because of the activities and causes we as a Congregation represent? Conservative Judaism among them.

Rabbi Steven Wernick, Executive Director of United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism, made the case during his visit to our synagogue that people today no longer join synagogues based on identity of affiliation; rather they will join synagogues based on an identity of purpose. What exactly does that mean? That's a good question.

I think part of its meaning is that we cannot assume that our membership will benefit from being the only Conservative Synagogue in the Portland area. On the other hand I don't think it gives us license to create services or pursue causes that fall outside the tenets of our traditions. What I am sure it means is that CNS must be excellent at all that CNS does. Excellence: that's a terribly high standard to obtain, unless you understand that the alternative may be to slowly wither and fade into unimportance. And unfortunately the membership of USCJ has many examples of congregations who failed to adapt to the times; I assure you Neveh Shalom is not and will not be another.

As you know we have a highly regarded Long Range Planning process in place that currently is taking an introspective look at who we are and how we are meeting the needs of our Congregation. And where we don't see excellence being obtained we are taking decisive action, making tough decisions. We are not there yet.

There is much work to do to align CNS's purpose with yours, but I have no doubts that we are headed in the right direction.

When Esther is reluctant to confront her husband, the king, and reveal her identity and the threat to her people, Mordecai chides her that if she doesn't act to save her people, help will come from some other source, but that she will not be spared. Thus Purim becomes that clarion call to tell truth to power, to risk position and even life to rescue others in peril. If one has access, it is incumbent to use it when appropriate and necessary.

Megillah reading this year will take place Saturday evening, March 19 and Sunday morning, March 20. Think about how outrageous you can be. Turn pots, pans, woks and ladles into noisemakers that you can donate to the Community Warehouse for new immigrants and those who desperately need.

Remember. Be joyous! It's Purim.

# CNS Receives Major Grant from the Covenant Foundation

Nevel Shalom is the recipient of a 2010 Ignition Grant from The Covenant Foundation, which supports creative approaches to educational initiatives that perpetuate the identity and continuity of the Jewish people. The grant will allow CNS to expand its Hebrew language programs for the Portland community.



The congregation will grow its well-known Hebrew immersion programs for children ages 0-8, Kochavim and Notz'tzim, to reach Portland's Eastside with partner Shir Tikvah. The synagogue will also create a new program, Machon Ivrit, an intense Hebrew learning program for adults community-wide. "Hebrew knowledge is a pivotal ingredient for children as well as adults to feel at home in Judaism, no matter to which stream of Judaism they belong," says **Mel Berwin**, founder and director of the language programs at Congregation Neveh Shalom.

Machon Ivrit will offer two adult-level classes using the respected Brandeis Modern Hebrew curriculum, and Jewish educators with little Hebrew proficiency will be encouraged to participate. The adult initiative will be a collaborative project of CNS; the Harold Schnitzer Family Program in Judaic Studies at PSU; Morasha, the Jewish Community Education Alliance; Portland Kollel; and, the Institute for Judaic Studies.

"We are particularly interested in acknowledging creativity in Jewish education and going where risk and innovation co-mingle," said Harlene Winnick Appelman, executive director of the Foundation. 





# **BRIEF PASSOVER GUIDELINES AND REMINDERS**

Passover is every Jewish adult's favorite holiday. It is filled with history, symbolism and meaning. The more we put into preparing and observing the Mitzvot of Passover, the more purposeful it becomes. For beginners it is difficult to do everything the first time. However the goal should be to add new pieces each year. Initial preparation often begins soon after Purim; setting the guest list for the Seder and planning to eat up the Hametz (see below) we have in our homes. In the last weeks and days the scouring of the kitchen, the changeover of dishes and purchase of Kosher for Passover foods takes place. It's hard work, but it's worth it.

> You will find below a reference guide for your preparation. PERMITTED AND PROHIBITED FOODS:

The Torah prohibits the eating or ownership of Hametz (leaven) during Passover. Hametz consists of foods containing any of the basic grains: wheat, barley, rye, oats and spelt. (Matzah itself is made from flour, but made with sufficient speed so that the dough cannot leaven.)

Prohibited foods include the following:

leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, the five grains (see above) and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

Most Ashkenazi authorities have added

\*Kitniot to the above list: rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas; however string beans are permitted). Peanuts and peanut oil are permissible, as peanuts are not actually legumes. Some Ashkenazi authorities permit, while others forbid, the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardi authorities permit the use of all of the foods which the Ashkenazi authorities added to the basic list.

\* Some Conservative movement authorities claim that there is no legal basis for prohibiting kitniot and they should be permitted to all Jews during Passover.

**Permitted Foods:** 

**A.** The following foods require no Kosher le-Pesach label if purchased prior to Passover: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee, sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea), salt (not iodized); pepper, natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives,

frozen (uncooked) vegetables; milk, butter; cottage cheese;

cream cheese, ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi soft), and Camembert (soft), frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.

**B.** The following foods require no Kosher le-Pesach label if purchased before or during Pesach: fresh fruits and vegetables, eggs, fresh fish and fresh meat.



**C.** The following foods require a Kosher le-Pesach label: All baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah), canned or bottled fruit juices (These juices are often clarified with kitniot which are not listed among the ingredients.), canned tuna (since tuna, even when packed in water has often been processed in vegetable broth and/ or hydrolized protein), wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt and soda. (If it is known that the juices are not clarified with kitniot and the tuna is not processed in vegetable oil or hydrolized protein, then they need no label.)

**D.** Liquid and powdered detergents permitted during the year do not need a Kosher le-Pesach label.

#### **Medicine:**

Hametz binders are used in many pills. If the medicine is required for life sustaining therapy, it may be used on Pesach. If it is not for life sustaining therapy, some authorities permit, while others prohibit. In all cases, capsules are preferred to pills.

## Kitchen Preparation

Passover preparation involves cleaning all areas of the house where Hametz may have been brought during the year. Central focus is on the kitchen: counter tops, cabinets, floors, refrigerator, freezer, microwave, and toughest of all, the stove. After thorough cleaning, line cabinets that will be used during Passover and counter tops with fresh paper. Table tops should be covered.

OVEN: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned, then turn oven heat to its highest setting and the burners all the way up for half an hour. Scrub and clean self-cleaning ovens and put through the self-cleaning cycle. Kasher continuous cleaning ovens as regular ovens. Clean microwaves and then place a cup of water inside. Turn on until the water disappears. (A microwave with a browning element cannot be kashered for Passover.)



**DISHWASHER:** After not using the machine for 24 hours, run an empty full cycle with detergent.

**ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES:** If the parts that ordinarily come into contact with Hametz are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (see below). If the parts are not removable, the appliance probably cannot be kashered.

**KITCHEN SINK:** Thoroughly clean and then pour boiling water over a metal sink. Clean a porcelain sink and use a sink rack.

UTENSILS AND DISHES: Ideally dishes and utensils which are only used for Passover should be used exclusively. The following rules apply to kashering dishes and utensils for Passover which are also used during the year. Leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil, i.e. utensils used in

cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

EARTHENWARE: (china, pottery)
may not be kashered. However fine translucent
(bone) chinaware which has not been used for over
a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.

METAL: utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible. Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water. Metal baking utensils cannot be kashered.



**GLASSWARE:** according to some authorities, should be soaked in water for 3 days, changing the water every 24 hours.

Others require only a thorough scrubbing and then put them through a dishwasher. Glass Cookware, some say that after a thorough cleaning, boiling water should be put in it which overflows the rim. Others require only a thorough cleansing.

Glass bakeware cannot be kashered.
