Israel On My Mind

By the time you receive this edition of the Chronicle, 27 of us will have settled into our hotel in Jerusalem. If all goes according to plan during

the celebration of Israel's 60th anniversary here at Neveh Shalom on Sunday afternoon, May 4, we will greet you live via web cam and Skype. Hurray for modern technology that permits us to be so close when we are so very far away.

We will have arrived in Israel the previous Wednesday and will look forward to sharing with you our first adventures in the Jewish Quarter of the Old City, at the newly renovated Yad Vashem Holocaust complex on Mt. Herzl, at the bustling Machaneh Yehudah produce market and following our first Jerusalem Shabbat.

However thinking ahead to our planned itinerary, I can't help but reflect back on my first trips to Israel. I can still remember how jubilant I was when I saw my first ElAl jet plane that would fly us from Kennedy Airport to Tel Aviv. It is difficult to imagine that the Jewish state was barely 21 years old when I arrived with a plane-load of fellow undergraduates for a year of study at the Hebrew University. The year was 1969 and the mood in Israel was euphoric. The Israeli army had only two years earlier not only saved her citizens from annihilation, but had won a stunning victory over the invading armies of all her neighbors. The Israeli university students, all of whom served in Israel's civilian army, were national heroes and they burst with macho and pride. They had so convincingly defeated the armies of the surrounding Arab states that further wars would, they were convinced, be inconceivable. Communication home to family that year was by aerogram; phoning was so expensive that most of us didn't even consider it.

I returned to Israel as a newly married rabbinical student for a second year of study to a very different Israel in 1974. Though Israel had by no means lost the Yom Kippur War a year earlier, the entire country projected a prolonged state of shock. The military attack

Shabbat Unplugged, Friday May 9 at 6:15pm. Shabbat Unplugged is our monthly meditation Shabbat service. The praying is a little slower, lots of English additions on a theme, a 5-10 minute meditation period and lots of singing. We always finish before 7:30pm and if you aren't comfortable meditating, there are always extra readings to look at. I read the names on the Yahrzeit list and Kaddish is part of the service. Although this service is not designed for young children, I've been amazed at how well behaved the children who come have been. If you're bored by services that are always the same, if you'd like

to learn a song each time, if you wish the praying could be slower, or if you want to think about a different theme each month, you might really be moved by Shabbat Unplugged. Shabbat Rocks the Rose City takes place on Friday, May 16 at 8:15 pm. The Percy Bernstein Orchestra is comprised of talented members of Neveh Shalom (plus one player we're working on). Tikkun Leil Shavuot: "Who Is a Jew?" Late Sunday Evening, June 8, beginning with Maariv at 8:15pm

"Who is a Jew?" has changed over the long course of Jewish history and continues to be debated among Jewish leaders and even in the Israeli Knesset. Judaism chose to become matrilineal (identity passing from birth through the mother) in the rabbinic period. The Bible never challenges the identity of children born to Jewish fathers (Joseph, Moses) and non-Jewish mothers. Also conversion, we are told, is a Jewish invention, allowing someone with no Jewish ancestry entrée with full rights and privileges. Nevertheless debates abound as to who is a legitimate Jew by Choice, frustrating converts and rabbis alike.

On Shavuot we study the Book of Ruth. Ruth, considered the paradigmatic Jew by Choice, simply professes her faith to her mother-in-law Naomi and is welcomed into the Jewish community without additional rites or requirements.

This Shavuot eve when it is traditional to study through the night, simulating the expectation our ancestors felt as they stood awaiting the revelation at Sinai, we will explore the controversial issue of formal Jewish "citizenship" with spokespeople from Orthodox, Conservative and Reform Movements. Can we resolve the painful problem of recognition by some, but not by others? We will debate and discuss, challenge and prod.

The major Jewish festival of Shavuot begins this year on Sunday evening, June 8 and will continue through Monday and Tuesday. Shavuot celebrates the climax of the seven week journey which took our Israelite ancestors from Egypt to Sinai, from human bondage to religious commitment to God. Receiving the Ten Commandments symbolizes our entrance into a life of obligation to God and to each other, a life of ethics and observance.

Join us for study and lively discussion. Let the sparks fly wherever they may. More details of our Tikun Leil Shavuot—Shavuot eve of study—will be available shortly on our website and in our June Chronicle. We hope to see you here.

had caught Israel unaware. The best trained army in the world, or that had become its reputation, was unprepared and came all too close to devastating defeat. The country we explored that year was in a deep state of self doubt and depression. Could Israel survive? Was the entire enterprise worthwhile? Would peace and security ever be achieved? I often wonder what the Palestine that my father experienced was like when he arrived in 1937 as an 18-year-old refugee from Nazi Germany. He shared only a few random stories leaving me with the impression of a mixture of hardship with camaraderie with others engaged in building what would eventuate in the Jewish homeland. He stayed until 1947 serving during World War II with the British army in North Africa. I have a stack of letters he wrote to family during those years, but they unfortunately reveal little about the mood and conditions in the country. My father came to America to join his mother and siblings and in doing so met my mother.

I am thankful for the privilege of having been able to visit Israel often over the years, but it is difficult to take the pulse of the country unless you live among the people for an extended period of time. Nevertheless we have felt the pride in technological and economic achievement, wonder at new archeological discovery, excitement and challenges when welcoming Jews from Ethiopia and the former Soviet Union, dreams realized and dashed in the search for peace.

Despite the impression one might receive from reading headlines, tourists today do not have the sense of visiting a nation under terrorist siege. The country is peaceful. The streets are safe Appropriate precautions are routinely taken and a part of life.

In recent visits I sense more and more frustration and a resignation that resolution to Israel's ongoing situation will not come soon if ever. Hope never dies, but the war in Lebanon last year, the unending rocket attacks from Gaza and the inability of the Palestinians now to rally around a single leader with whom to conduct productive negotiations does not bode well for the immediate future. And internally Israelis are dissatisfied with their own democratically elected directionless leadership.

But we are joined at the hip, we Jews in America and our brothers and sisters in Israel. And so we rejoice when they rejoice and we commiserate when they commiserate. We will have more to tell upon our return. We look forward to speaking with you directly from Israel on Sunday afternoon, May 4.


