What Makes Community: People and Places

This edition of our Chronicle is dedicated to exploring “What Makes Community: People and Places.” Even in the digital age, we understand that people are the essential ingredient of community. Yet we are on less certain ground when we wonder about the role that physical place has in community. After all, aren’t there virtual places that are just as real to us? I don’t have an easy answer to that question, though my own personal bias is that as people with physical bodies and physical needs, real places matter more than we might imagine.

Embracing the Unexpected

By the time you hold this edition of the Chronicle in your hands, we will have concluded the High Holiday season. Looking at it from the other end, that seems unbelievable to me. Autumn is loaded down with Jewish holidays. How will they go? In some ways, I can predict an answer. I expect that more people will have shown up on the first day of Rosh Hashanah than the second, and that more people will have appeared for Simchat Torah than for the lesser known Hoshanah Rabbah. In my mind’s eye, I can see how the main sanctuary will fill to capacity during Kol Nidrei or the Torah reading on Yom Kippur, then gradually empty until afternoon gives way to evening, and Neilah calls us all back.

But that isn’t really a significant answer. What I am really asking is how will our families have gotten along during this stressful time? (Yes, across cultures, holidays increase our feelings of stress.) I want to know how our communal services moved you. Did you spend the holidays “downstairs” with Rabbi Posen and Ilene Safyan? Do Ilene’s lovely voice and Rabbi Posen’s lesson to renew our lives with the best of old and new still reverberate with you? Did they change the way you think about your life? I hope so.

Were your holidays interrupted by sudden news, good or bad? Will some event in your life mark this year’s holidays for you? A birth or death, a promotion or loss of work? Did you catch up with an old friend at synagogue whom you hadn’t seen in a long time? Did you have a sudden insight into your past behavior that suddenly has recast how you view your life?

A community formed of people who share space together, whether frequently or infrequently, is filled with the serendipitous and the unexpected turn of event. To live with



others is to invite events and moments into our lives that we can’t control. This is key. More and more, our electronic social media seduce us by promising us that we can fully author what we present and how we are perceived.

That desire to steer our lives is understandable. Yet such a scripted life also brings with it ennui and boredom, and a reduced sense of our significance or our authenticity. Human beings need surprise, whether it brings with it wonder or discomfort. It keeps us growing and learning. It forces us to react in the moment so that we can better understand where we are graceful, and where we ride rough shod over our relationships. On December 10th, we will read parshat Vayetzei, in which Jacob suddenly awakens to the surprise in life and exclaims, “Surely God is in this place and I did not know it.” Such unexpected moments provide basic nourishment to our souls.

As we spend more and more time in the virtual world, I believe there is another danger lurking for us besides the vital loss of surprise. That same desire to control our lives makes it more likely that we will choose to interact with those who think like us, look like us or act like us. While that provides more comfort initially, ultimately it separates us. Our country is sorely divided. Yet we hold in our hands the power to change that fact.

For that reason, I offered you the following charge at the end of my sermon on the first day of Rosh Hashanah. I asked you to become a bridge this year, and to reach out to people, family

We started this partly because we wanted to express our gratitude for this wonderful moment in our lives, and partly because we thought if the baby regularly heard the same song at wakeup, she would know when it was wakeup time. Wishful thinking. We continued this tradition through Shiri’s first year of life, but as she began to express herself, she’d tell us to stop singing the minute we started. Where was the gratitude for our sweet daily routine?

Flash forward to Matan’s birth. We were getting very little sleep, we had a cranky three-nager, and then right as Matan turned two weeks old, Duncan left for a business trip to Orlando. Suddenly my own gratitude was gone. And then it happened. While I was driving Shiri to school on the first morning of these dreaded four days, “*Modeh Ani*” came on the Solomon Schechter CD we were listening to. Shiri lit up and started to tell me what she was grateful for that morning. Cue the tears.

While we are supposed to start each day with a proclamation of gratitude for waking up, sometimes it’s difficult to do. Life seems to get in the way of truly recognizing those moments of miracle and wonder. It can take a special moment with a loved one in the car or the kind gesture of a stranger to snap us back into a place of gratitude.

Despite how I feel even on my most sleep-deprived day, I know how lucky I am to have not only my loving immediate family, but the loving Congregation Neveh Shalom community.



In that moment in the car with Shiri as I was exhausted and overwhelmed, I got my gratitude back too. That moment made me thankful for this sweet moment with my three year old who gave thanks for her school, her shul, and her friends, all of which are in our lives because of Neveh Shalom.

In this season of giving thanks, I am so grateful to you, my CNS community, for all of the meals, gifts, visits, and support we received as we welcomed our newest gift, Matan, into our lives. Thank you!

As a side note, it’s amazing to be able to write this while sitting on my couch with a snoozing Matan on my chest. Life is sweet, and for that I’m grateful.



This year, the theme of our ALIYAH program is "asking questions." The way we formulate questions helps us to frame the world, to imagine new possibilities, and to create new ways to be in the world. Each day we are asking our youth: What good question did you ask—or hear—today?

This Rosh HaShanah, I came away with so many good questions that I will ponder throughout the year. Rabbi Kosak's drash on 2nd Day Rosh Hashanah asked us to think about "*Mensch*" as a verb: when we "*mensch*" we perform actions that make the world more just, and we inspire others around us to do

the same. Who around us *mensches* in inspiring ways? What *mensching* did you do today? What *mensching* could you have done better?

In our 3rd-6th Grade RH service, we similarly played with the word *mitzvot*. How can we translate *mitzvot* so that we can talk about them in the evening and morning in a meaningful way, as we are asked to do in the Shema? What if we talk about *mitzvot* as "right actions" or as "life-affirming actions?" What would it mean if we reviewed our life-affirming actions each day with our children?

These are some of my questions.

What is important to you?


"Israel is important to us. Our children have been to Israel five times. Family is central to our existence. Our family celebrates Shabbat every Friday night either with the four of us or with our extended family. We eat dinner together every night. Family time is very important."

What does community mean to you?

"The Kahns lead and ask others to join them. We actively engage in our community. Neither we, nor our children, sit on the sidelines waiting for someone else to get something done. We have taught our children to use their voices, not wait for someone else, to be proud of who they are and to know where they came from. We have taught our children, through our actions, to work for the survival and continuation of Jewish community and Jewish life. We believe in the important notion of Jews taking care of other Jews first. That is what community means to us."

An Introduction to the Feldstein Library's Beit Midrash

One of the unsung wonders of our Feldstein Library is the Beit Midrash. What and where is a Beit Midrash you ask? A Beit Midrash is a study hall and ours, also known as Room 111, is on the other side of those double doors at the far end of the Library.

So let's assume you need to look something up or do Jewish study with the classic Jewish texts for personal or scholastic reasons. And let's also assume you looked again at your collection of three books at home and this time your Tanach, Siddur and copy of "Heritage" by Abba Eban are just not going to cut it. When you find yourself in this position, the Beit Midrash is the place to go.

Most of the time you don't have access to the books you need, or you wind up needing yet another resource, or you have a place to work that has most of the resources, but most of them are in Hebrew or Aramaic and you read English. If this is you, then the Beit Midrash is for you.

The Beit Midrash has four walls of bookcases housing over 250 ft. of our classic books, mostly in English, has two large conference tables and 13 cushy chairs.

The Tanach (Bible) section has single volume copies of the

Tanach, but also single volumes for each of the books in the Tanach. We have the five volume modern set of commentary by the Jewish Publication Society but also the classic volumes in English of the commentaries by Rashi and Ramban. If your needs are somewhere in between, we have a few hundred books in English that cover that as well.

If your needs are a little deeper, the Beit Midrash has you covered. Our sages said in the name of Rabbi Yehoshua: "One should always divide his study-time into three - a third should be devoted to Scripture (Tanach), a third to Mishnah, and a third to Talmud." This might be good advice if you're preparing a talk or a paper as quoting from varied sources. It is usually informative and the Beit Midrash can help you make short work of it.

The first third, Tanach, we discussed above. The second third encompasses the body of work called Mishnah and we have both single volume and two full sets of the Mishnah. The Philip Blackman version from Judaica Press is in Hebrew, flowing English and word by word Hebrew/English commentary. The 21-volume Kehati Mishnah is a fast-reading English version that has become an international standard with clear English translation and a good flowing English commentary.

The final third of our classic works is the Talmud. The Talmud itself contains Scriptural verses, Mishnayot and Halakhot, and, of course, the reasoning and logic behind the laws of the Torah. For Talmud study and resources we have the full set of English language Soncino Talmud, a full set of the modern Schottenstein Talmud with many extra volumes and the Steinsaltz version of the Talmud. For those who choose, we also have a beautiful full set of the Vilna Shas printed in 1951.

For all of these sources, we have a full complement of dedicated dictionaries, indexes and commentaries both for Hebrew and English study and a big table to spread out on. For classic Judaic study, the Feldstein Library's Beit Midrash is the place for you. Check it out soon.

Jewish Travel Notes

Fanny and I recently returned from a 6-week trip to Africa (Tanzania/Zanzibar, Botswana, Zambia, Zimbabwe and South Africa). As always when we travel, we try to make some Jewish connection related to the places we visit. What was different this time was the general absence of Jewish content. Although South Africa has a relatively large Jewish population, (and many South

African Jews live in Portland), our time there was brief, limited to two days in Johannesburg where our attention was focused on the Apartheid Museum, and Jewish support of the anti-apartheid movement, and a few days in Cape Town where we had virtually no time on our own.

Nevertheless, we were very curious about what Jewish presence there was or might have been in the other countries we visited. Except for the short city visits in South Africa, the focus of this trip was on Africa's natural beauty and the animals to be seen on safari, so we had little time in cities, where any Jewish presence or history would most likely be found.



We did not encounter any indication of a Jewish presence during our time in the Serengeti (in Tanzania) and our inquiries in Zanzibar (an island nation integrated into Tanganyika to create Tanzania) an ancient trading center also came up empty. Because of the trading history of Zanzibar, this was rather surprising, but questions to our very knowledgeable and helpful local guide provided no joy.

In Botswana, where the highlight was our time in the Okavango Delta, we never came close to a city, although there is apparently some Jewish presence in the capital city of Gaborone, mostly connected to the Israeli Embassy and agricultural interests.

We next traveled to Zambia. Our activities were out in the "bush," but we did pass through Livingstone (yes, that Livingstone, you presume) a city about 10 miles from Victoria Falls. This area of east Africa, also including Zimbabwe, was previously known as Rhodesia and Northern Rhodesia. There was a small population of European Jews in Livingstone, beginning in the late 19th century, including at least one of whom figured prominently in Zambia's struggle for independence from Britain. There is a former synagogue in Livingstone, which is now a Christian church.

So no synagogue visits, no kosher meals, no Shabbat service, but in one fashion or another the idea of Jewishness was still present for us during our Africa journey.

The last country on our itinerary was Zimbabwe, a country of great physical beauty, wonderful and kind people, and a totally bankrupt, corrupt and non-functioning government. We never got close to Harare, the capital, which was a good thing. We did however, discuss the curious and interesting story of the Lemba people of southern Zimbabwe with Esther, the manager of one our game camps.

The story of the Lemba has echoes of the stories of other "lost tribes of Israel," but there may be some reality here: they do not eat pork, males are circumcised, they practice a form of ritual slaughter of their animals, some men wear skull caps and a 'star of David' can be found on gravestones. None of this proves "Jewishness," (or Islam), but hearing the story from Esther at our camp in the Hwange National Park, made an impression.

So no synagogue visits, no kosher meals, no Shabbat service, but in one fashion or another the idea of Jewishness was still present for us during our Africa journey.


