#### Message from Rabbi David Kosak

This summer, I ended up on a twin prop airplane for an hour and a half flight. The plane was old, and I got to pondering the thin skin of the plane, the rotating propellers, and the history of flight. My window was directly above the landing gear. Watching the small wheels pick up speed as the blades spun faster until we lifted off still gives me a visceral thrill. The miracle remains fresh.

Since the earliest days of human history, we have wanted to fly, creating myths to record that yearning. It's about freedom, isn't it, our ancient desire?



Simultaneously, the business of contemporary flight is all about confinement. Even by airline standards of today, the seats were piled on top of one another. The seatbelt light blinks, and we dutifully strap ourselves in. Bring elbows in tight so as to not intrude on our seatmate's equally cramped space. The tension between freedom and limitation is a good metaphor to think about our High Holidays this year.

Coming out of this grueling run of a pandemic—or at least entering this more spacious phase—also places us on the tottering fulcrum between freedom and restriction. I am so grateful for the work of our clergy team, professional staff, and lay leaders. These efforts have created a model in which we can return to the building and live, in-person, services. Where possible, social options for families and learning opportunities for adults have been created. Freedom. Normalcy.

At the same time, this High Holiday season will feature limited numbers in services as we maintain appropriate social distance. We have had to make adjustments to service structure so that we can accommodate the largest number of congregants possible. There are other changes. We will all need to hustle out at the conclusion of services so other members of our congregational family can safely enter for their service slot. To organize this flow of people, pre-registration will be required and if we are being straight, that is something with which our community has often been a bit lax. Confinement. Restrictions.

If the desire for the freedom of flight is ancient, so too are the warning tales. The Greek story of Icarus, who flies too close to the sun, is well-known. His wax wings melt and he comes careening down. We have our versions. There is an obscure story in which Judas is fighting on behalf of the Jewish people. In this story, he is flying around the throne room of Queen Helena. People watch in awe. In order to protect us, however, he has to take an action that will send him crashing down.

These cautionary tales are a reminder that we are a community of individuals, each of whom assesses risk and opportunity differently. Some of our Neveh Shalom family have health issues or for other reasons aren't yet ready to return to the building. For these treasured congregants, I want to assure you that you will be able to join our services online. We have done our best to balance the freedom and confinement of this moment in time for the needs of all.

One of the salient features of the Days of Awe is how we recite a collective litary of shortcomings. None of us have transgressed the entire list, yet we each own a part of it. We gather together in a recognition of our shortcomings and an acknowledgement of our common humanity. As we come together this High Holiday season, I am sure we will all do so holding on to that truth as we respect our differing approaches to gathering and celebration and keep our hearts open to the difficult decisions placed upon our community and on each of us.

May this be a New Year of increasing freedom for all. Let's rejoice in the many miracles that allow us to assemble. May we all have the opportunity to spread our wings once again.

#### **IMPORTANT - About the Registration Process**



Our registration process is online this year. Gathering as a community on the Days of Awe is one of our most sacred traditions. Whether you choose to join us in person or participate online, we look forward to a meaningful and inspiring High Holy Day season. Please read these registration steps carefully.

- 1) You will need to register for each service you wish to attend in-person. This is necessary to ensure our commitment to physical distancing, and our health and safety protocols.
- 2) When registering you will be asked to indicate your intention to attend in-person or online. For in-person, you will then be asked about your service preferences, including a ranking system for the main service options. After we have received all registrations, we will send out confirmations with tickets for specific services.
- 3) All registration is online and <u>due on August 18</u>. You can access the registration form through <a href="https://nevehshalom.org/hhd5782">https://nevehshalom.org/hhd5782</a>. Members, have your member portal login info ready. Tickets will be mailed around August 25.





#### **About Online Services and Programs**



#### A few notes about online options:

- This year, congregants can have a full HHD experience in-person at Neveh Shalom, online, or a combination of both. Unlike last year, when all services were virtual and in some cases pre-recorded, this year we have choices that meet the needs of congregants who want to gather in-person or join in from home. If you are participating online for health and safety reasons or as a result of space limitations in our building, there are multiple options for viewing or participating in online services and learning throughout our Days of Awe.
- 2. All of the main services and many of the family services and learning options will have virtual options. Those services have the symbol next to them. Prior to the High Holy Days, we will send further information with details on the live-stream, Zoom, or other platforms for these programs and services, with links for connecting. Please note, you must register for services even if you plan to attend online.
- 3. As with anything that is online, there is always a possibility of technical challenges. Just like last year, we will provide a section on the website for help with technical issues. And of course, we apologize in advance for any inconvenience.
- 4. The information in this booklet represents the most accurate information we have at this time. We are closely monitoring the public health guidance from the state and our own Health Committee. If for any reason we need to change any of our services from in-person to an online-only format, we are prepared for this possibility and will communicate accordingly.

#### **Family Services & Events**

Children are welcome in **EVERY** service at Neveh Shalom. You are also invited to these services specifically designed for children and families.

- PRE-REGISTRATION REQUIRED. This year we've worked to offer a variety of services and programs that you can join in person or online, indoors or outdoors, to accommodate your family's comfort level. Please note that all services (including online) other than Shanah requires pre-registration (see page 6). All in-person services have capacity limits. Attendees will need tickets in order to enter the specific in-person services for which they have registered.
- SIBLINGS. Parents are expected to stay and participate with children in Family Services. We realize you may not be able to accompany each of your children to the age-appropriate service. We welcome younger or older siblings at every family service and we encourage you to attend the one that feels like the best fit for your family.
- SUPERVISION. We are not offering childcare or a game room this year. Because of capacity limits and health concerns in our sanctuaries and program spaces, children must be supervised and accompanied by an adult at all times. Please watch for signs about spaces where gathering, playing, and socializing are welcomed.
- LEADERS. Our Young Family and Grade K-6 Services are led by a combination of Morah Leah Conley, Rabbi Eve Posen, Mel Berwin, and our Kiddush Club/ALIYAH teachers: Gershon Liberman, Deb Freedberg, and Sarah Rohr.

There are a limited number of copies of the physical mahzor available to CNS members, 1 per family. It is important to note that our mahzors represent a \$60k investment by the congregation, so care and return of the books is very important. A system for distribution / pick-up of the books will be sent to all who select this option. Books must be returned to Neveh Shalom in undamaged condition by Friday, September 24, 2021. Any congregants not returning the Mahzor will be charged \$54 for the book.

#### Congregation Neveh Shalom's Covid-19 Policy as it relates to HHDs

As you have read throughout this booklet, there are multiple ways to participate during this year's High Holy Days: inside, outside, and online. If you are coming to the building for in-person services, here is our current policy.

#### Health

Only come to the CNS building if you are feeling healthy. Do not come to CNS if you're feeling ill and for sure, do not come to CNS if you have COVID – including being asymptomatic.

#### Vaccination

All congregants, guests, and visitors who are eligible to be vaccinated and will be in the building for more than 15 minutes are expected to be vaccinated. Children under the age of 12 and those not eligible for vaccination are welcome to attend services/programs in the building.

#### Masking While at CNS

All congregants, guests, and staff are required to wear appropriate and correctly fitted (covering nose and mouth) facemasks in all public indoor spaces at CNS. An exception is that leaders of and honorees at worship services (clergy, lay leaders, etc.) may be maskless during the time that they are leading the service – but will appropriately distance themselves from worshippers.

Masking continues to be encouraged, though not required outdoors while on the CNS campus.

CNS expects members, guests, and staff to adhere to this masking policy while on campus to protect the vulnerable and unvaccinated among us, including children. Those not adhering to the policy will be asked to put on an appropriate mask; if that individual refuses, they are subject to removal from the CNS premises.

#### **Physical (Social) Distancing**

CNS continues to provide for physical distancing in seating/room set-ups for services, education and programming. While there are no "state-mandated" capacity limits, each CNS space does have a capacity limit which will be reduced in order to provide for physical distancing.


