From the Pulpit



Ever since I arrived at Neveh Shalom, many congregants, particularly those studying for conversion, have asked me why I feel compelled to follow Jewish Law. How is it that one truly feels a sense of being commanded to enact God's mitzvot? There are many classical rationales for observing mitzvot, though I am personally most compelled by my debt owed to God. My own faith and compliance with God's torah is driven by a need to express thanksgiving. If I take time for introspection, I am overwhelmed by the blessings bestowed upon me that continue each day. Because I view myself primarily as a recipient, I feel

duty-bound to repay The One who has enriched my life. Often times in prayer I acknowledge that which has taken place on my account. I feel ashamed in front of my maker, for there is not a balance between what has been done for me and what I have done for God. My debt leads me to welcome "obligations of gratitude." I owe God not only for the richness of my own experiences, but for the gifts given to others as well. My personal bill of life's accounting is quite high and overdue.

In our torah, God has made clear that what is requested of humanity is the obedience to God's law and thus the fulfillment of divine will. God clearly views humanity to be indebted to the One Who Spoke and The World Came Into Being. We are constantly reminded of the deeds done on our behalf. The Decalogue begins with God's self definition as the redeemer from Egypt, suggesting that we must follow divine law because of the divine positive actions done on our behalf. Because God calls out to man seeking the enactment of mitzvot, I believe adhering to the mitzvot is a fitting start to repayment. Undeniably, one may not feel in debt towards God if they have seen more atrocity in life than blessing. Why should they feel indebted to God if the life God has given them has been only filled with misery? The problem of evil uproots or at least complicates all theories for obedience to the Law.

Alongside my tremendous sense of debt towards God, I obey God's law because it is Divine Law. I do not primarily seek God's way because of any personal reward, hope for knowledge,

or guidance. I do not commit to God's way primarily because God will be closer or because I aspire to be like God, or even because I read or feel that God loves me. If God is absolute, the eternal knower of all things, than I am drawn to manifesting God's will. We all observe the mitzvot in different ways and for different reasons. Mitzvah means commandment. The mitzvot are a language with which we are able to connect and converse with the transcendent. I have found them to be a spiritual discipline to express and give thanks to the One who always was, is, and will be



We are particularly proud to note a wonderful entry in the new version on our own Rabbi Emeritus, Rabbi Joshua Stampfer. We all know what a wonderfully productive, impactful and meaningful life he has had, now the rest of the world can learn as well. It is with pride that we reprint the entry on Rabbi Stampfer below: Stampfer, Joshua. Bezalel Gordon.

STAMPFER, JOSHUA (1921–), U.S. Conservative rabbi, historian. Stampfer was born in the Jewish Quarter in the Old City of Jerusalem and was brought at the age of two to the United States, where he grew up in Akron, Ohio. He earned his B.S. from the University of Chicago in 1943 and his M.S. from the University of Akron in 1945. He returned to Jerusalem to study at the Hebrew University and volunteered to fight with the *Haganah in Israel's War of Independence. He was ordained at the *Jewish Theological Seminary in 1949 and received a D.H.L. from the *University of Judaism in 1972. In 1987, he was awarded an honorary Ph.D. from Pacific University. He served as rabbi of Congregation Tifereth Israel in Lincoln, Nebraska (1949–53) before becoming rabbi of Congregation Neveh Shalom in Portland, Oregon (emeritus since 1993). Under

his leadership, Neveh Shalom grew to more than 1,000 families, to become one of the leading Conservative synagogues in the Pacific Northwest. Influenced by his teacher Mordecai *Kaplan, Stampfer initiated egalitarian changes, encouraging women to read the Torah and counting them in the minyan long before it became more commonplace within the movement.

A past president of both the Oregon Board of Rabbis and the Pacific Northwest Region of the *Rabbinical Assembly, Stampfer brought dynamism to the greater Oregon Jewish community as well. In addition to developing innovative educational programs at his own synagogue, Stampfer was instrumental in founding the first Jewish day school in the city, Hillel Academy (now the Portland Jewish Academy). He established and chaired the Oregon Jewish Historical Society, the Oregon Holocaust Resource Center, the Oregon Jewish Museum, and the Oregon Israel Jubilee Committee. In 1983, he founded the Institute for Judaic Studies, sponsoring symposia and conferences (in conjunction with the University of Oregon and Portland State University, where he serves on the faculty) that bring Jewish scholars to an area of the country considered remote. Remembering the influence of Shlomo *Bardin's Brandeis Camp on his own life, Stampfer founded and directed Camp Solomon *Schechter, the only Conservative Jewish summer camp in the Pacific Northwest.

Stampfer created and nurtured organizations beyond the boundaries of Oregon as well. His travels and contacts with the remnants of the ancient Jewish community of Kaifeng, China, and the Converso families of Belmonte, Portugal, led him to become the founding president of the Society for Crypto-Judaic Studies, to support research on the vanishing traces of the *Diaspora. He was also an organizer and the first vice president of the Sino-Judaic Institute.

Stampfer has maintained close personal and professional ties with Israel. He spent his sabbaticals working for and teaching at the fledgling Center for Conservative Judaism in Jerusalem. He encouraged support for Israel at home and led more than a dozen community and clergy tours to Israel. He was a co-founder of Oregonians for Peace Now and a member of the national board of Americans for Peace Now.

Stampfer was a long-standing appointee to the Oregon Government Ethics Commission and was actively involved in interfaith dialogue with Muslim and Christian leaders. He was the author of Pioneer Rabbi of the West: The Life and Times of Julius Eckman (1984), and a volume on ancient history, Cradle of Civilization in the Middle East (n.d.). In addition, Stampfer edited six books: Prayer and Politics: The Twin Poles of A.J. Heschel (1985); Dialogue, the Essence of Buber (1986); The Sephardim: A Cultural Journey from Spain to the Pacific Coast (1987); All Its Paths Are Peace (1987); Islam and Judaism, 1400 Years of Shared Values (1988); and The Last Crypto Jews of Portugal (1990). A biography of Stampfer's life, To Learn and to Teach (by David Michael Smith) appeared in 2003.

Aside from congregational input and the expertise of staff and lay leadership, our greatest asset in driving a Master Plan for Neveh Shalom is our partnership with the talented professionals at Soderstrom Architects. For the past several years, Henry Fitzgibbon and his team at Soderstrom have advised the congregation with knowledge, experience, warmth and understanding as we have embarked on the very important mission of remaking the building and campus for generations to

It started with master planning—what should we do—and has continued on through design, engineering, site and space planning, budget development—what can we do—and a variety of other vital services to help the congregation take the proper steps along the way.

Soderstrom also

has advised the congregation on the best approach to sustainability—an aspect of this campaign that holds deep meaning for the Jewish community. As part of the Neveh Shalom/Soderstrom team, there is now a dedicated green building consultant shepherding our ability to be sensitive to the environment during construction and to ensure our new building operates at peak efficiency over the long term.

One of the most exciting activities the architects have undertaken during the process is a trip last winter to visit 26 synagogues on the East and West Coasts. Accompanied by Executive Director Fred Rothstein and Building & Grounds Chair Jeffrey Weitz, they soaked up the rich architectural examples that exist today and also studied past congregational success stories and drew from others that had informative lessons for us as we embark on our ambitious Master Plan.

As we move closer to securing the services of a general contractor (more on that process in next month's *Chronicle*) and begin preparing to move the campaign further ahead, it's comforting to know that our professional relationship with Soderstrom Architects is right for this project and right for our congregation's future.

Community Warehouse Needs Your Stuff

There is never a slow day at Community Warehouse. This last year, over 3000 families received essential furnishings at no cost. These are people from our community who are working to overcome domestic violence, homelessness, mental illness, substance abuse or disability. A mattress and box spring, a kitchen table, pots and pans, silverware, a blanket—things most of us take for granted—these are the items most needed by families coming to the Warehouse for assistance. Religious School

How is knowledge measured? In the secular world, tests and grades are used primarily when determining a student's ability to understand a subject area. It is certainly not the only means of evaluation, but indeed grades and exams play an important role in the scholastic life of the student. These measurements are inadequate when we attempt to evaluate Jewish learning. In religious school education, the student's success, growth and understanding of the teachings of the sacred texts, holiday celebrations, and life cycle events, is based upon the lessons that the students and their families put into practice and live by. Tzedakah is the Hebrew word for the acts that we call "charity" in English. Tzedakah has as its root Tzade-Dalet-Koof, meaning righteousness, justice. In Judaism, giving to the poor is not viewed as a generous act; it is simply an act of justice, the performance of a duty. Our kids learn about Tzedakah in their classes, collect money, donate clothes and food and care about the environment. The challenge for us all is to continually keep the less fortunate, our community, Israel, the elderly, and our world in our minds, not only at specific times of the year.

Tu B'shevat, the Jewish holiday for trees, will be celebrated on February 3rd. There are several tzedakah opportunities connected to this minor holiday. First, it is a tradition to donate 91 cents to a charity of your choice. Ninety-one is the numerical equivalent of the Hebrew word Elan which means tree. Because Tu B'shvat reminds us of the importance of trees and of our environment, we donate money to the Jewish National Fund to plant trees in Israel. Here in the United States, we can dedicate time to beautify our parks, neighborhoods, and synagogue grounds in honor of the holiday.
