Perfecting One's Own Soul



When Hayyim of Zanz was a young man, he set about trying to reform his country from its evil ways. But when he reached the age of thirty, he looked around and saw that evil remained in the world. So he said, "Perhaps I was too ambitious. I will begin with my province." But at the age of forty his province too remained mired in evil. So he said, "I was still too ambitious. From now on I will only try to lift up my

community." But at fifty he saw that his community had still not changed. So he decided only to reform his own family. But when he looked around he saw that his family had grown and moved away, and that he now remained alone.

"Now I understand that I need to begin with myself." So he spent the rest of his life perfecting his own soul. When I reacquainted myself with this classic Hassidic tale my first impression was that there was something very un-Jewish about it. Is it possible for a Jew to give up on his country, his province, his community, his family (!) and only concentrate on himself? Doesn't the story have more of a Buddhist ring to it, i.e. if everyone simply worked on perfecting him/herself, evil would eliminate itself? Continued on page 9



FROM THE PRESIDENT



In the May Chronicle I shared with you some thoughts on the rights of a synagogue member. This follow-up has been delayed for a few months due to space limitations in the Chronicle, but I think it is still pertinent to talk about our responsibilities as members of the Neveh Shalom community.

1. Just as you have the right to attend synagogue and be welcomed, you also have the responsibility to welcome new members, visitors and guests to our congregational

community.

- 2. You have the right to attend the synagogue service that most fits your need for worship, but you also have the responsibility to attend regularly, and to try new venues. You may discover something that works even better than what you are used to.
- 3. You have the responsibility to continue to seek opportunities for learning throughout your life. Too often we view Judaism as a "pediatric" faith where education ends at the age of Bar or Bat Mitzvah. Neveh Shalom offers a wide range of educational opportunities for everyone—take advantage of them!
- 4. Since we all have the right to moments of quiet when true prayer can occur, it is our responsibility to make sure that happens—you can go to the lobby if you need a break; make sure your cell phone or pager is in silent mode (or off); and help others to understand that the sanctuary is a place for thoughtful contemplation.
- 5. While it is your right to sit in your "regular seat" it is your responsibility to be on time to claim that seat. It is also your responsibility to be flexible enough to be welcoming to someone who might have unknowingly taken your "regular seat" if you arrive late.
 6. It is our responsibility as a congregation to help families find a way to be comfortable in the sanctuary, even when their youngest members are not quite ready for a long service. As a community we must provide adequate child care facilities for those who would like to give their kids a break, and we must find more ways to include younger members of our community in synagogue services.
- 7. It is not only a right but a responsibility to participate in synagogue worship. As we always say in Girl Scouts, "Sing good and loud—if you can't sing good, then sing loud." There is something affirming about being with others and joining together in spoken and sung prayer—sometimes the mere act of opening your mouth and vocalizing helps to change your mood.
- 8. You have the responsibility to voice your opinion; others may be thinking as you do, but are afraid to speak up if you hold a minority opinion. Neveh Shalom is a very diverse community, and not everyone agrees about everything—and that is how it is supposed to be.
- 9. You have the responsibility to try to pray—it doesn't always work, but at least make the effort. The prayerbook and service provides some structure to prayer, but you are responsible for your own spiritual health. If one service doesn't work for you, then try another (see #2).
- 10. Once you have been informed of synagogue events, you have the responsibility to be a participatory member of the congregational community. We are adding and modifying programming and services all the time, so take advantage of all the opportunities your membership provides. And if you have ideas for things you would like to see here, share it with our staff and lay leadership—we will try to make it happen.

May you and your loved ones have a Happy, Healthy and Sweet New Year.



FROM THE PULPIT CONTINUED

Rather Judaism teaches Tikkun Olam, our individual and collective responsibility to make the world a better place, to fight bigotry, to undermine abject poverty, to end war and disease, to treat those with whom we come in contact with respect and dignity, to do whatever great or small in our power to ready the cosmos for the Messiah who will announce the end of historical time.

Hayyim's naiveté, of course, was to imagine that his efforts would meet with total and immediate success, rather than consider small and incremental advancements admirable achievements.

But Hayyim is directing us to another truth and one which goes to the heart of the Aseret Ymei Teshuvah, the Ten Days of Repentance, that lie before us in the next days. That truth is that Teshuvah, real turning, does not begin out there, but rather in here. Pointing fingers at all the wrongs in the world alone will not get us where we want to go. Teshuvah begins through self examination and scrutiny. We must each recognize our own failings, to make amends and direct ourselves in a better direction. Though on Yom Kippur we confess our sins in the plural, we do so not so that we can excuse ourselves as just one of the sinning extended community. It is vital that we read ourselves as directly implicated in having spoken unrighteous words and engaged in inappropriate deeds and know that we can improve. It is in that context that we stand before our Maker on these Days of Awe, that each and every one of us must begin with ourselves and spend these days doing what we might to perfect our own souls.

L'Shana Tovah Tikatevu v'Tehatemu/ May we all be inscribed and sealed for a good new year. Carol and I share our wishes with you for a year of health and peace, family harmony and personal fulfillment.



After a quick Motzi, we broke bread, and sat down together to reflect on a successful start to the Tikkun Olam Committee's Mitzvah Action agenda. All told, this was a super successful start to the Tikkun Olam Committee's Mitzvah Action Agenda for 5767-8!!!


