FROM THE PULPIT

Once in a Generation - For Generations to Come

Outdoorsy Ancestors!

Tradition instructs us to begin building our sukkah immediately after Yom Kippur. We are to break the fast, walk home from synagogue, and hammer the first nail into our sukkah. After we spend the day acting like angels, denying ourselves of earthly affirmations such as food, we begin to ground ourselves with the holiday of sukkot. During sukkot we come back down to earth and feast and play in the sukkah. As we venture outside to recognize our own vulnerability it would behoove us to remember that our ancestors were outdoorsmen. Abraham, Sarah, Moses and Miriam all found God outside in the heat of the desert. Anytime the Tanakh mentions a sacrifice, offering or altar, it required the outdoor ingenuity of our relatives they arranged stones and built fires from scratch. Jacob's famous ladder was part of a dream he had after curling up under the stars. We are a people of the moon, the sages of the Talmud depended on the moon to set the festivals and calendar of our ancient civilization. We know our ancestors spent a great deal of time looking up at the sky because Jewish law instructs us that Shabbat begins when you can barely see a certain glow after the sun has set and Shabbat ends when there are three stars in the sky (there was no www.hebcal.com.) We can be sure that King David and Devorah the prophetess spent many nights gazing up at the dark sky contemplating their fate. Today as we look up through our sukkah to the stars we may wonder if we are gazing at the same sky. Surely some of the coastal redwoods have been here since the time of Abraham. So as the leaves begin to fall and days get darker let us recall the outdoor prowess of our ancestors and our people's tradition of going outside. Sarah, Adirah, and I wish everyone a year of joy and new beginnings.

Concert with Cantor Alex Stein Sunday, November 4, 2:30pm

Cantor Alex Stein is an Australian Tenor born in Sydney to an Orthodox family that has been steeped in Jewish musical tradition for four generations. At the early age of seven he sang Chazzanut and Operatic arias at



concerts and by the time he was seventeen years old he was conducting his own High Holiday services at the North Shore Synagogue in Sydney, Australia. His talent and dedication at such a young age soon distinguished him as the youngest Cantor to be appointed in Australia. Cantor Stein's extensive training at Cantorial Schools in both the US and in Israel was enriched by many years of formal training from his grandfather, Cantor Shlomo Weinstein Z'L., who learned in the "old school of chazzanut" from Cantor Leopold Edelstein in Yugoslavia. While studying in New York, he also attended "Master Voice Opera Classes" at the Julliard School of Music. This diverse education helped Stein to develop his unique, powerful and lyric tenor voice that is unusual in quality and range, brilliant in tone, and rich in warmth and expression. He is now firmly established as one of the up and coming "Great Cantors" of the new era. Recently Cantor Stein was featured in concert with the Calgary Philharmonic orchestra. He will feature again with the Calgary Philharmonic in June 2008, this time under the direction of Maestro Marvin Hamlisch, at the "Three Cantors Concert". Cantor Alex Stein serves as Cantor at Western Canada's largest synagogue the Beth Tzedec Synagogue in Calgary, where he resides with his wife Shoshanah and their children Mendy, Doron and Meital.

CANTOR'S NOTES



Now is a great time to join either the Neveh Shalom Adult Choir or the Percy Bernstein Orchestra or both!

Hopefully, you got a chance to hear our amazing choir on the High Holy Days. Most of the choir started off not knowing anything about Jewish choir music but wanted to sing with us. By being part of the choir, you get to sing with really nice

people (like you!) and learn not only about Jewish music and Jewish composers but also about Jewish liturgy. Our conductor, Becky Thompson, attends the North American Jewish Choir Festival each summer and now is not only a talented conductor but also is on the fast track to becoming an expert in Jewish music. Call or write to me if you want to be a part of one of the oldest traditions of Congregation Neveh Shalom.

On the other hand, The Percy Bernstein Orchestra is one of Congregation Neveh Shalom's newest traditions. Our orchestra, under the baton (okay, he doesn't really have a baton) of Ethan Chessin, is a great way to play Jewish music in a fun context. Anyone who has at least three years experience on their instrument is welcome to come try out. We are happy to welcome any instrumentalists but right now we are especially looking for electric guitar and bass players. Before each performance there are just two or three rehearsals. You can commit to one performance or all five of this year's performances. The upcoming dates for performances are Nov. 16, Jan. 18, Feb. 15, March 21, and May 16.

Starting Tues., October 23 at 7:00pm for 5 sessions I'll be teaching P'sukei D'zimra. This early part of the service each Shabbat morning is traditionally led by a layperson. It is the warm-up for the rest of the service to come. I will be making cds to help the students learn the service so hopefully, you can take a turn leading our P'sukei D'zimra service. Or at least be great at following along. Come learn more about this meaningful part of our liturgy.

Finally, there are two events coming up that you might want to be part of. On Sat. Oct. 27 at 7:30pm and Sunday Oct. 28 at 2pm the Portland Symphonic Choir will be performing Psalms and Meditations: Masterful Judaic Music. Remembrance by composer Judith Zaimont was commissioned especially for this event and was funded by our congregant and choir member Ariel Rogson. It will take place at Congregation Beth Israel.

Waking Up in the Middle of Our Lives: A contemplative Shabbat retreat with the Institute for Jewish Spirituality will take place Feb. 1-2, 2008 in Santa Rosa, CA. 



In this documentary Friedman explores various "green" and "not-so-green" technologies--hydroelectric, solar, wind, and nuclear power, hybrid, electric, and hydrogenfuel-cell cars, clean-coal, bio-fuels, and energy-conservation methods. He looks at what works to reduce the output of greenhouse gases, carbon emissions and ultimately stop global warming and ensure political stability throughout the world. Run time: 67 min. 


