#### Message from Rabbi David Kosak

Lev Shalem

Living well doesn't happen automatically, although sometimes we get glimpses of moments and places where it seems effortless. I've only been to Italy once, in my early twenties, but it had a profound impact on me. If you want to discover a culture dedicated to the joys of family, food, and conversation, spend a week in Tuscany. Built deeply into the fabric of life—at least back



in those days—was a clear message that work is not the purpose of our days: the joy, conversation, and connections we build at the dining table are a central piece of being human.

In Judaism, the Shabbat table fills a similar role, though the differences are just as important. Built into the culture of our Friday evening meal are experiences of holiness, gratitude, and a vibrant sense of unity and joy that occurs when we sing together.

Each of these vignettes reminds us that while living well doesn't happen automatically—someone has to make the pasta or polish the Shabbat candle sticks—cultures create ritualized forms that transmit lessons and values of what it means to live well. It is also true, however, that major shocks to a society sometimes unravel those forms, stripping away teachings that have almost invisibly been handed down over the generations. In the long traumatic aftermath of the Shoah, there are ways that we are still recovering the joy which resides at the heart of Judaism. Similarly, the can-do spirit and optimism of America, an optimism that essentially states life is good and can be made better, has withered away after many shocks. These days, many Americans primarily see where our nation has gone wrong.

That focus on the negative isn't inherently bad. One of Judaism's central concepts is that of *teshuvah*, or reflecting on the past to improve our future by

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
repairing our actions and relationships. Assessing our errors and failures is most valuable, therefore, when its purpose is improving the present and the future.

This year, our collective efforts as a synagogue and *kehillah kedoshah* center on this positive effort at making our daily lives better by developing a *lev shalem*, **a whole heart.** Without a doubt, living well requires that we nurture our sense of whole-heartedness. Over the course of the year, this notion of living with and developing a *lev shalem* will filter into many of our social, educational, and spiritual offerings. Simultaneously, each of our teachers, clergy, staff, and congregants will have a slightly different understanding of what happens when we learn, love, and lead with whole hearts. Some of those differences can be accounted for by where we will focus our attention and inquiry; other differences will occur because as a society, Americans are engaging in a deep process of asking what it means to live well. As our congregation explores how and what it is to live with a *lev shalem*, there will be a very real process of learning through discovery. *Na'aseh v'nishmah* (we will live and learn): by committing ourselves to whole-heartedness, we will come to discover what it is. And that will indeed make for a better, sweeter year!



As Rabbi Alan Lew once noted, "We are conditioned to choose pleasure and to reject pain, but the truth is, any moment of our life fully inhabited, any feeling fully felt, any immersion in the full depth of life, can be the source of deep joy."

**10:00am Mel Berwin Entering this Year with Whole Hearts** What if whole-heartedness doesn't mean feeling happy and complete all the time but embracing the bitter with the sweet? Susan Cain asks this question in her book, *Bittersweet*: "How are you supposed to integrate this bitter with your sweet, how are you supposed to feel whole again?" In our session, we will dive into texts both ancient and modern that help us open our hearts (and remain whole) in this new year.
