Message from Rabbi David Kosak

BE A BLESSING

Jews don't kneel in prayer, though once upon a time they did. The last vestige of this is seen during the Grand Aleynu on Yom Kippur, when a kneel turns fully earthward. It's a shame Jews stopped kneeling, especially considering that our ancestors did so freely. Abraham prostrated himself before God and angels alike, as did Joshua and King David. Moses and Aaron once led the entire nation to kneel before God in gratitude that their offering had been accepted (Leviticus 9:24). Just moments before, Aaron had raised his hands and blessed the entire nation.



This is hardly an accident, for the Hebrew word for knee and bless share the same root, b.r.k. (ב. ת.). What is this strange connection between knees and blessings?

To kneel is to pray, as British writer Mary Spain made clear in her poem, "A Need to Kneel."

I have a need to kneel, though it is hard
To formulate just why this should be so...
To dropp (sic) below/My normal height is once again to know
The trust that children share and men discard...
My fundamental essence that would share
Its dropp of life with life's far greater seas,
Which, on my knees, can be expressed as prayer.

Do children, who readily and happily tumble to the ground, share a type of trust in life itself that adults forget? To willingly fall assumes we will rise again, yes, but there is also something about kneeling that changes how we see the world, leading us, the poet muses, to a desire to share our individual small "dropp" of life with all of creation. This is important.

As a boy, I can remember the mystery of the prayerbook, darkly bound and serious-looking. In it's grim appeal, it seemed to say a prayer is something static, inked in place on the page. A prayer, a *bracha*, is just these words, immoveable. Indeed, religious school back then was intent on teaching us to parrot the prayers perfectly.

We are fortunate to posses what is known as a fixed liturgy: This means we can attend services around the world and recognize the words, regardless what language the Jews there speak. Our blessings, cast in place, unite us powerfully, changing little over the centuries. Yet something in the fixedness of our prayers has stopped us from kneeling in prayer the way a child drops into the grass in love with the world.

As both etymology and spirituality teach us, a blessing is something dynamic, much like the knee, which is essential to movement. It is meant to be alive, a flow of energy that comes from beyond us, moves through us, before it lands on the object of our blessing. When it doesn't do this, when it has lost all of its vitality, it's probably no longer a blessing. Laura and I customarily bless our boys on Friday nights with the *Birkat Kohanim*, the priestly benediction. In addition, each week, I add a few words of personal blessing that recognize where my children are in that moment, and what gifts of spiritual energy they require. Most weeks, this worked, but every so often, my prayers felt flat. I hadn't tuned in to the liveliness of the world.

As the High Holidays draw near, Jews all over the world will gather to celebrate a new year with family and community, come to terms with our past actions, and yes, offer up a great many prayers. More than ever, the world needs all of us to recover our innate human capacity to be a blessing to ourselves and others; it is the antidote to our entitlement culture, which seeks to draw the energy of the world to ourselves and leave it there. An entitlement presumes we are owed something. It is like a lake in to which water flowers but never leaves. To be a blessing is the opposite. It asks how we can be part of the flow, giving and receiving, never stagnant. To make our lives a blessing is to be aware of the sacred dimension of existence. That might sound a bit rarified, but the experience is close at hand. Any time we volunteer and feel a renewed sense of purpose, we make ourselves a blessing. When we offer an ear to a friend in need and give them our full focus, we are a blessing. If we give a warm smile to a store clerk, and receive their smile in return... it's all blessing. Bandaging a skinned knee is a profound act. The ways to be a blessing are limited only by the horizon of our hearts and imaginations, but each time we find our way, the energy of connection flows to and through us, like an electric current, and we are recharged.

This year, you will begin to notice signs around the building declaring: "Amen. Be a Blessing." Just as we focused last year on living with a *lev shalem*, a full heart, this year we will continue that process both by being a blessing to others, and by becoming aware of all those who are a blessing to us. Each of us is indeed a drop of life; we fall, we kneel, we rise again, part of the great thrumming sacred sea of blessing that unites us all.

This year, ask yourself: how will you be a blessing?

Shanah tovah u'metukah.




High Holy Days Food Drive: Operation Isaiah October 2-12
